

## Funding Levels (FY24 vs. FY26)

*This table compares final funding levels for key programs in fiscal year (FY) 2026 and enacted funding in FY24, when appropriations bills were last previously enacted. Given the FY25 year-long continuing resolution for spending, there is not publicly released information on final spending levels for FY25.*

<sup>3</sup> The LHHS FY26 report states, “In addition to the directives included in [Senate Report 119-55](#), SAMHSA is directed to brief the committees on any requirements to continue issuing CCBHC planning grants to states that have not received such awards, as well as if any additional costs are incurred by establishing a joint technical assistance center initiative.”

Per [Senate Report 119-55](#), the \$500,000 increase is provided for expanded technical assistance to improve integrated care through the CCBHC State Technical Assistance Center and the CCBHC Expansion Grantee National Training and Technical Assistance Center.

<sup>4</sup> [Senate Report 119-55](#) states, “The committee encourages SAMHSA to develop a CCBHC data infrastructure and data repository program while establishing a data reporting partnership with at least one state currently operating a statewide CCBHC network. With more than 500 CCBHCs operating in 46 states, it is incumbent upon the agency to assure a high level of accountability in concert with expanded access to intensive community-based services for persons with serious mental illness and substance use disorders. Within 90 days of enactment of this act, the committee requests a briefing from SAMHSA on opportunities to undertake this project using the funds provided.”
